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## *Guided Reading Lesson Plan for 3rd Grade | Study.com*

Simply put, guided reading is an instructional approach when the teacher works with a small group (up to 6) of students. The teacher is teaching specific skill or strategy to the small group of readers. These students may or may not be reading the same exact text or at the same exact reading level.

## *Introduction to Guided Reading (Small Group Reading ...*

The teacher selects a text for a guided reading group by matching it to the learning needs of the small group. The learning focus is identified through the analysis of running records (text accuracy, cueing systems and identified reading behaviours), individual conference notes or anecdotal records, see Running Records).

OVERVIEW In this lesson, the teacher explains the difference between thin (factual) and thick (inferential) questions and then models how to compose question webs by thinking aloud while reading. Students observe how to gather information about the topic and add it to question webs in the form of answers or additional questions.

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
